About Atlanta Pride

Atlanta Pride is the oldest and largest Pride organization in the Southeastern United States. Our annual October festival, coinciding with National Coming Out Day, is the largest free Pride celebration in the country, drawing over 350,000 attendees and thousands of volunteers from across Georgia and beyond.

The festival celebrates identity, visibility, and love, and it powerfully demonstrates our community's enduring strength. For over five decades, Atlanta Pride has stood as a symbol of resistance, remembrance, and resilience for LGBTQ+ people, particularly in the South, where advocacy and safety are often hard-won.

Pride is more than a weekend. Year-round, Atlanta Pride invests in community programming such as town halls, art exhibits, youth engagement, health and wellness events, and civic education initiatives. We offer grants to local Pride organizations across the state, amplify grassroots voices, and serve as a cultural and political hub for queer life in the Southeast. Through your volunteerism, you become part of this critical work.



Mission & History

Atlanta Pride cultivates vibrant and inclusive community for LGBTQ+ people in the Southeast by amplifying diverse voices, fostering meaningful connections, and celebrating the rich cultural expressions that unite and uplift our community.

This mission is not just aspirational—it guides every decision we make: from our festival committee to our philanthropy and community programming.

Pride must be more than a party: it must be a platform for visibility, equity, healing, and progress.

Historical Highlights

Founded in 1970 after the Stonewall Uprising

Atlanta Pride began in response to the "Lonesome Cowboys" raid and the wave of LGBTQ+ activism that emerged nationwide following Stonewall. Our first events were acts of resistance and survival.

Moved to October in 2009

Atlanta Pride intentionally shifted the festival's hosting to October to align with National Coming Out Day and respond to environmental conditions in June.

First march organized in 1971

The inaugural Atlanta Pride Parade traces its roots back to an unpermitted march that LGBTQ+ activists organized along Peachtree Street in June 1971. Activists had to stay on the sidewalks and stop at traffic lights because the City would not authorize an official event.

Expanded programming beyond the festival


What began as a single annual event has become a year-round organization committed to education, advocacy, and celebration. Today, Atlanta Pride runs dozens of community events, engages in policy advocacy, and funds grassroots LGBTQ+ initiatives across Georgia.

Atlanta Pride continues to grow and evolve, driven by a deep commitment to inclusivity, accessibility, and empowerment. Volunteers play a key role in this legacy, making every step forward possible.

General Volunteers

Responsible for recruitment, scheduling, and retention of volunteers. Handle all volunteer requests during the Festival, placing volunteers where most needed. Work in coordination with all other Committee Co-Chairs.





KEY INFORMATION

Check-In: Arrive 20 minutes early at the Volunteer Booth (near Greystone Pool House) or Parade Assembly point.

Parking: No volunteer parking is provided.

Use rideshare or take MARTA (Arts Center Station for festival; Civic Center Station for parade). No neighborhood parking available.

CHECK-IN

- Bring your photo ID, phone, sunscreen, and QR code confirmation.
- · Receive your festival t-shirt and credentials at check-in.
- · Meet your committee lead for updates.

EXPECTATIONS

- Treat everyone with dignity and respect as a volunteer, you represent Atlanta Pride!
- Volunteers are expected to be sober and professional during shifts.
- Wear your official volunteer t-shirt and closed-toe shoes at all times.
- Stay at your assigned location unless directed otherwise.
- Follow instructions from your committee lead or Atlanta Pride staff.

SAFETY & POLICIES

- Know where the nearest exits, first aid tents, water stations, and info booths are located.
- Report injuries, issues, or unsafe behavior to your lead or staff do not call 911 unless directed.
- Follow instructions for weather emergencies or evacuations.
- Prohibited: alcohol, drugs, weapons, smoking/vaping, accessing unauthorized areas.

CODE OF CONDUCT

- Respect all identities and pronouns.
- Respect the privacy of others.
- Report harassment, discrimination, or unsafe behavior immediately.
- Do not speak to press or represent Atlanta Pride officially.

This includes language or actions that demean, intimidate, or incite harm toward individuals or groups based on identity.

Stay in public areas and follow staff guidance.

IF YOU NEED HELP OR SEE SOMETHING CONCERNING, NOTIFY A STAFF MEMBER OR VOLUNTEER IMMEDIATELY. TOGETHER, WE CAN KEEP THIS A SPACE FOR EMPOWERMENT, VISIBILITY, AND SOLIDARITY.

Any violation of these community standards may result in immediate removal from the event at the sole discretion of Atlanta Pride.



Dress Code & Identification

Wear your official volunteer t-shirt (provided at check-in): This shirt identifies you as an approved volunteer and helps festival-goers find trusted support.

It must be worn at all times during your shift.

Wear comfortable, closed-toe shoes.

You may be standing, walking, or assisting with logistics for long periods. For safety, please don't wear open-toe shoes, sandals, flip-flops, or heels.

Dress for the weather:

October weather in Atlanta can vary. Hats, sunglasses, rain ponchos, and layers are strongly encouraged.

Keep sunscreen on hand and reapply as needed.

Avoid clothing with offensive or inappropriate content:

This includes shirts with political messages (unless they align with Pride's values), profanity, or imagery that could be interpreted as exclusionary or inflammatory.

Bring minimal personal items:

Lockers or secure storage will not be available. Bring only what you can carry, and keep your phone charged for communication.

While enjoying the festival off hours, please ensure that you are NOT wearing your volunteer shirt. All volunteers are encouraged to participate outside of their volunteer hours, but please do so in non-volunteer attire.

If your role requires specific attire (e.g., vests, name badges, or gloves), it will be issued during orientation or check-in.

Please return all borrowed gear at the end of your shift.

Safety & Emergency Procedures

Prohibited Items & Actions:

To protect yourself and others, the following are strictly prohibited:

- Firearms, fireworks, knives, or any other type of weapon.
- Alcohol, recreational drugs, or working under the influence.
- Unaccompanied children or pets (except registered service animals).
- Unauthorized use of carts, bikes, scooters, or personal vehicles on festival grounds.
- Piedmont Park is smoke-free due to a City of Atlanta ban on smoking and vaping in all outdoor parks and recreational facilities. This includes the use of all tobacco products, such as cigarettes, cigars, pipes, e-cigarettes, and vapes.

Emergency Contacts & Reporting:

If you need to report a concern and can't find a staff member, contact Volunteer Headquarters. Your supervisor will coordinate with security or medical teams in emergencies to handle the situation appropriately.

Volunteers should not call 911 unless specifically instructed to do so. Most of the emergency responders will already be on site, so please follow your committee's protocol for reporting emergencies.

If you have questions, please contact the Community Engagement Coordinator or your Committee Chair(s).

Following these safety procedures and knowing your resources, you help us make Atlanta Pride joyful, safe, accessible, and affirming for all.

I agree to be a volunteer at the Atlanta Pride Festival, produced by the Atlanta Pride Committee, Inc. (hereinafter referred to as "APC").

I acknowledge that I have received and reviewed the Pride Volunteer Information Handbook, a copy of which is incorporated herein by reference and attached hereto.

I understand that I am a volunteer and that I represent Atlanta Pride.

I agree to treat each guest of the event with dignity and respect.

I understand that I may be relieved of my volunteer duties at any time and for any reason by the Atlanta Pride Volunteer Coordinator, other Festival Committee Co-Chair(s), or the Executive Director.

I understand that I may not serve as a volunteer if I am under the influence of alcohol or drugs, and that I may not consume alcohol or drugs during my shift(s).

By signing this release, I give permission to Atlanta Pride to use my photograph in any materials produced by Atlanta Pride.

I understand that I am not an official spokesperson, employee, staff member, Festival Committee Co-Chair or Board Member of Atlanta Pride.

I understand that I am not authorized to speak on behalf of Atlanta Pride, and I may not obligate Atlanta Pride in any contractual matter, nor do I have decision-making authority with regard to public safety matters.

I agree to abide by all rules set forth by Atlanta Pride and further agree to hold harmless the City of Atlanta, Piedmont Park Conservancy, and Atlanta Pride for any acts performed by me outside the scope of my activities as a volunteer.

I understand that if I am unwilling to agree to all the terms and conditions above, I will be unable to volunteer for the 2025 Atlanta Pride Festival.
